Recruitment Procedure

a. Participants

This survey investigation will be conducted via convenience sample to the researcher. That is, undergraduate college students at The George Washington University will make up the population subject pool. For sake of establishing significance, a sample of 100 respondents will be the goal for the current study. This sample will likely allow for generalizability for the 18-24 age demographic range.

b. Recruitment

In light of the ongoing virtual learning period due to the COVID-19 pandemic, online platforms will serve as the sole method for recruiting participants. Students at The George Washington University have access to Facebook pages respective to their expected year of graduation (e.g. Class of 2023). A link with the survey accompanied by a brief description of its scope and aims will be made available on these pages. Twitter will also serve as a platform for recruiting participants. Due to the accessibility of the survey to the general public, a screening question will be used to ensure *only* GW students may participate. Lastly, Blackboard will serve as a method to send mass emails to student populations for recruitment. I will work to formulate a blanket email to students on available class rosters with a link inviting them to participate.

Qualitative Interviews

Intended design: I plan to conduct individual interviews with participants (via convenience sample from GW undergraduates; N=6-7). These interviews will follow the same question themes as the survey that accompanies this project (i.e. intellectual humility, mindsets, political ideology, and candidate favorability). A key difference in this aspect of the study will be to allow a space for individual participants to elaborate thoughtfully on their answers in a more conversational setting. Interviews will likely take place via telephone or video conference call due to the ongoing COVID-19 pandemic. Participants will be informed that their answers will be recorded for the purposes of this project—and that confidentiality will be ensured. The individual interview set-up is an attempt to control for potential social desirability concerns. Given the aims of measuring forms of polarization and beliefs about individual mindsets/ psychological factors, participants may be more inclined to elaborate fully on their answers in a one-on-one setting. Results from the interviews will be included in the final report of this project.

<u>Directions and introduction:</u> Thank you for agreeing to take part in this qualitative interview study today. The following topics and questions are designed to guide us through a discussion revolving around political attitudes and opinions—as well as contemporary political issues in the United States.

There are a whole host of issues that bring about conflicting points of view, attitudes, and passionate opinions amongst the public. To this end:

I. Intellectual Humility

- a. How does it feel when you encounter somebody that contradicts your personal beliefs?








